Hope Army

Hope Army has grown substantially over the past year, totaling 462 total recruits. Engagement with recruits in 2021 included the mask awareness campaign and the "Give Two Get Two" window decal campaign launched in the fall. Moving forward, engagement efforts will include more advocacy work, starting with a "Screening letter" to be sent out amongst recruits in hope that they will share it with elected officials. Additionally, the videos going out in the beginning of 2022 will showcase a side of lung cancer that doesn't always get to be seen. We hope to grow the Hope Army throughout the year in order to raise further awareness of lung cancer, with a focus on advocacy.
